Our special Libby Sturdy will present a lecture about Ribbon Ladies which was a popular hobby in the 1930's - 40's.




November 16, 2020 **Mrs. Ginger Claus** - Workshop *Libby Sturdy*


April 19, 2021 History & Display of Stuffed Dolls - Presentation *Linda Montcalm*




While the challenges of the past few months have certainly given all of us the opportunity to do a lot of reading, a blessing is that there have been such wonderful choices of both fiction and non-fiction that have given me a long list of recommendations.

Award Winners


I begin with two novels that have been nominated for the Booker Prize, one of the most prestigious of awards.



The first is Hilary Mantel's *The Mirror and the Light*. The novel is the final work in her three volume study of the life of Thomas Cromwell. If you haven't read the first two, I recommend that you start there with *Wolf Hall* and *Bring Up the Bodies*. The long journey will take you through the fascinating politics and intrigues of Tudor England.



The second Booker nominee is Anne Tyler's *Redhead by the Side of the Road*. In it a creature of habit suddenly finds himself confronting challenges that will force him to see the world through new eyes.




The Pulitzer Prize winning novel for 2020 is another of my recommendations. It is Colin Whitehead's *The Nickel Boys*, a novel that tells the story of two boys sent to a reform school in Florida. The story is based on the actual 111 year history of a Florida reformatory that housed thousands of children.






Three other novels also deserve your attention.



Louise Erdrich, one of my favorite authors, tackles the 1943 U. S. government's attempt to dispossess Native Americans of their land in *The Night Watchman*.




Tayari Jones explores the ways in which uncontrollable forces can challenge one's capacity for love in her novel *An American Marriage*.




Finally Ann Patchett's *The Dutch House* tells the story of siblings, their relationship to the titled house, and the roles of love and greed in the lives of a family.

MYSTERIES

There are four mystery novels out of an outstanding group that were written recently that I think are among the very best of the crop.




The first is by Michael Connelly, one of my very favorites, whose recent novel, *Fair Warning*, features veteran reporter, Jack McEvoy, who discovers the link between a serial killer of women and the dark web.




Robert Harris, whose mystery novels usually have an historical setting, tackles both the modern world of high finance and technology in *The Fear Index*. This novel should have special appeal for husbands and sons.

Donna Leon, the author of the Guido Brunetti mysteries set in Venice, has written the twenty-ninth novel in the series. This one *Trace Elements* deals with murder and the contamination of the water supply in Venice.



The Last Trial by Scott Turow focuses on the final case accepted by the defense lawyer, Sandy Stern. As exciting as the trial scenes are, it is the human drama of Stern's growing awareness of the meaning of the end of his career that makes this both a powerful novel as well as a legal thriller






Pat's Picks

Nonfiction


There are three works of non-fiction that I highly recommend.




The first is Bill Browder's autobiographical account of doing business in Putin's Russia. The focus of the work is very apparent in the title of the work: *Red Notice: A True Story of High Finance, Murder, and One Man's Fight for Justice*.



Still another look at Winston Churchill's leadership during WWII, *The Splendid and the Vile*, by Eric Larson focuses on London during the blitz and Churchill's ability to lead during this dark period of history.




The third work is Isabel Wilkerson's *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontent*, a study of the way in which a hierarchy of human divisions has shaped America through a system of human rankings. Wilkerson's first work, *The Warmth of Other Suns*, won the National Book Award. Of her new work the NY Times critic wrote "It's an extraordinary document, one that strikes me as an instant American classic and almost certainly the keynote nonfiction book of the American century so far."



Author Spotlight

JOSEPHINE TEY


Josephine Tey was the pen name of the Scottish author Elizabeth MacKintosh who wrote during the first half of the twentieth century. While her novels involve mysteries, they are so strong in characterization and plot that the reader can easily appreciate her as a first rate novelist.




In five of her novels, her hero is the Scotland Yard Inspector, Alan Grant. The most famous of these is *The Daughter of Time* that deals with the infamous murder of the princes in the Tower of London. While Grant is hospitalized he tries to discover whether Richard III was indeed the author of the murders or whether the primary sources at the time point to a different villain.

Try these three novels to get a taste of Tey's special talent.

There being no other business, Cindy Vander Woude moved and Libby Sturdy seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Motion was carried and the January 20, 2020 HEG Business Meeting was adjourned at 10 am.

3. Respect the Privacy and Posts of Others

What is shared in the group should stay in the group. Any photos or other information should not be shared without the express permission of the poster.

4. No Political, Controversial or Personal Topics

There are many, many other places to have these types of discussions. This is not the group for that. Posts in these categories will be removed. Repeated violations are grounds for post-preapproval of all subsequent posts or removal from the group.

5. No Sharing of Designers' Patterns

Out of respect for designers, and copyright laws, we do not allow sharing of patterns, even "free" patterns. Do not post photos of patterns, even if you have purchased the pattern. We take this matter seriously and any violations are grounds for expulsion.

6. Credits for a Project

When posting a photo of a project, if the project has not been self-designed it is respectful to identify the designer. It also enables someone who might be interested in doing that project to look for it, eliminating the potentially multiple inquiries asking for designer of the project. If a project is self-designed then it's appreciated to specify that as well.

7. Be Kind and Please No Bickering

Do not offer advice, opinions, or criticism regarding the work of others unless asked. Make no personal attacks, use foul language or make snarky remarks. If you have an issue with a post or another person in the group, please contact an administrator. Please do not argue as it detracts from the peace and safety of our group.

8. No Promotions, Spam or Selling

Give more than you take from this group. Self-promotion, spam and irrelevant links aren't allowed. Please no selling of patterns, materials, or finished products.
